The British Florist Association together with the Institute of Professional Florists has produced a list of flowers and plants which are potentially harmful to staff and customers. A special thank you should be made to Rosemary Hughes for her contribution and hard work.

The vast majority of plants and flowers sold by a florists are entirely harmless, however some may have sap, pollen or seeds which are potentially harmful. Some are toxic if digested and others can cause some skin irritations. It is always advisable to keep flowers and plants out of the reach of pets and small children. Hands should always be washed thoroughly after handling regardless of if you are a florist, consumer or enthusiast.

ESSENTIAL GUIDELINES

- No plants or flowers sold by a florist should be done so for human or animal consumption.
- All plants listed are safe to purchase and sell as long as precautions are taken. If you are particularly sensitive you may wish to wear gloves when handling materials.
- Information on these products should be relayed to all staff members and be accessible for them to refer to easily.
- Any customers buying these products should be advised accordingly by staff members.
- Within the home, retail or event situation, No harmful plants or flowers should be placed where pets or children are likely to brush agains them or digest them.
- All staff and customers should wash hands thoroughly after handling plant and flowers

Suggested ways to advise customers and staff safely.

The Potentially Harmful plants and flowers leaflet

The above information can be purchased from the British Florist association in a counter top leaflet form. This can be given to customers who are interested or are purchasing an identified item. Staff can also use the leaflet as a reference sheet.

Care cards

Having specific printed care cards accompanying potentially harmful flowers and plants is a good way to make sure information is available to customers and/or recipients.

Verbally

A simply conversation with a customer can be sufficient to relay the information needed.

If irritation occurs through	Recommended Advice
Digestion	Drink plenty of water and seek medical advice immediately should you feel un-well.
Skin contact	Wash area immediately with soap and warm water. If irritation persists seek medical advice immediately.
Contact with eyes	Rinse thoroughly with cold clean water. If irritation persists seek medical advice immediately.
